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Methodology Overview

In 2023, the Asthma and Allergy Foundation of America (AAFA) began the process of updating the State Honor Roll for Asthma and Allergy Policies in Schools. The previous version from 2019 can be found here: https://www.aafa.org/wp-content/uploads/2022/08/aafa-2019-state-honor-roll-report.pdf.

In 2024, AAFA convened 19 expert stakeholders to advise on updating the policy standards for the 2025 report. These experts contributed valuable insights through roundtable discussions, helping to ensure the standards reflect current best practices and needs of K-12 students with asthma, food allergies, anaphylaxis and related diseases.

AAFA also contracted with Seed 2 Roots, and began working with legal researcher Natasha Frost, a lawyer who has completed several 50-state reviews on a variety of topics.

Led by Legal Researcher Natasha Frost (Legal Researcher) and Subject Matter Expert Jenna Riemenschneider (Subject Matter Expert) AAFA conducted the 2025 State Honor Roll research following the steps below:

Step 1: Policy Standards

AAFA convened 19 individuals as part of an Expert Workgroup to advise on updating the State Honor Roll's policy standards.

Step 2: Initial Searches

Legal Researcher completed searches in legal database.

Step 3: Search Adjustments

Subject Matter Expert reviewed searches using outside resources and knowledge of the existing state laws on specific indicators, resulting in expanded search terms.

Step 4: Final Searches

Searches, including additional searches, were completed and downloaded specifically for review.

Step 5: Search Review

Search results split between Legal Researcher and Subject Matter Expert to be reviewed for applicability and tracked in chart.

Step 6: Results Analysis

Applicable results were reviewed for scoring using a standardized protocol, with non-standard results using a 2-reviewer authentication.

Step 7: Final Results

Legal researcher completed searches in legal database. Final protocol for each indicator confirmed and final review completed to ensure consistency.





Step 1: Policy Standards

In February 2024, AAFA convened 19 individuals with expertise in a range of fields including schools, health care, policy, climate and the environment, and building science, to provide input on AAFA's State Honor Roll core policy standards and extra credit policy standards. The experts were divided into 2 workgroups for roundtable discussions focusing on Medication, Treatment, and Awareness policies, and School Environment policies. Following these discussions, the State Honor Roll standards were updated based on input from the workgroups and redistributed for additional feedback. This iterative process ensured the updated standards reflected expert insights before final approval.

Step 2: Initial Searches

Legal Researcher completed searches in legal database. Legal researcher used the Westlaw legal database, using search term rubrics of that database. The initial searches were focused on specific words related to the concepts identified in each indicator. An overarching word search was identified using broad terms for asthma, anaphylaxis, allergy, epinephrine and albuterol. Any indicators that needed other search terms were also identified. Initial searches were completed in April–May, 2024.

Step 3: Search Adjustments

Subject Matter Expert reviewed searches using outside resources and knowledge of the existing state laws on specific indicators, resulting in expanded search terms. Outside resources used for the following indicators as a cross reference included the Public Health Law Center, National School Board Association, and Environmental Law Institute. Additional words and phrases were added to the search terms. In addition, the indicator language was adjusted by the Subject Matter Expert and her team in order to better reflect the goals of the scoring.

Step 4: Final Searches

Searches, including additional searches, were completed and downloaded specifically for review. Legal Researcher completed state searches using the search terms in both statutes and regulations. Each state's results were downloaded and saved temporarily for review. Results were tracked in Excel to reflect how many results found and how many were downloaded. If any results were not downloaded, the exclusion criteria was established and tracked in the Excel spreadsheet. In addition, a summary of the results was downloaded to cross reference for future steps. Finally, searches were saved in the Westlaw legal database. A summary of the searches are outlined below:

Step 5: Search Review

Search results were split between Legal Researcher and Subject Matter Expert to be reviewed for applicability and tracked. Legal Researcher reviewed Medication and Treatment standards and Subject Matter Expert reviewed the School Environment standards.

For the Medication and Treatment standards, a Word document was created to capture all relevant statute and regulations by state. Legal Researcher went through each search result, doing a line-by-line read to identify whether the indicator was addressed. If any possible language was identified, the language and legal citation was cut and pasted into the Word document.

For the School Environment standards, the Subject Matter Expert created a detailed Excel table. Any relevant search results were identified and included in the table, including the specific language and citation of the statute or regulation.

During this process, it was identified that Westlaw did not have the Northern Mariana Islands statutes and regulations. A specific protocol was established. Northern Mariana Islands statutes were found on the website: https://cnmilaw.org/cmc.php#gsc.tab=0&gsc.sort=date. Legal Researcher completed specific searches using the Westlaw search terms. This process has limitations because Google search engine has different search rubrics than Westlaw, so the search parameters did not always work. Based on limited resources, the additional protocol was identified to review the Education section of the statutes. Legal Researcher reviewed those statutes for search terms and indicator using standard legal research methods. This protocol was identified for regulations using the content found here: https://cnmilaw.org/admin.php.

Step 6: Results Analysis

Applicable results were reviewed for scoring using a standardized protocol, with non-standard results using a 2-reviewer authentication. Legal Researcher and Subject Matter Expert had several meetings and email exchanges to find a common analysis. This analysis was written down to ensure consistency. Any exclusionary results were also included. Once the analysis was complete, the downloaded statutes and regulations were deleted. The analysis completed on all standards was based on a standardized legal review of the plain language of the law and did not consider other policies or components of implementation.





Step 7: Final Results

Final protocol for each indicator was confirmed and final review was completed to ensure consistency. Legal Researcher captured the final standardized protocol, which is outlined below. Subject Matter Expert did a final review to ensure consistency with the final protocol. Each indicator includes the corresponding statute and/or regulation with language and situation for tracking purposes. This information was captured in a detailed Excel spreadsheet.

Limitations

The protocol and results have limitations for the final State Honor Roll including limitations on scope, applicability and timing. The search in Westlaw does not include any legislation that was passed but not codified by the time the searches were completed. Any appropriations were also excluded from the searches. The applicability of the statutes and regulations are limited by the results of the search terms. Additional laws could be included in statutes and regulations that do use the identified search terms. The timing of the search is also a limitation, as it was completed over the course of 6 months (April to September 2024). States may have changed their laws during this window of time.







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
